Wisdom is a tricky thing. It tends to be hard-earned. You might learn the dangers of booking a budget-airline when you show up to the gate, proud of the \$70 round-trip ticket you bought. You glance around and notice a long line of people measuring the size of their carry-ons. As you slowly shuffle forward in line, you notice your carryon is the largest. You get to the front of the line, give the flight attendant a nervous smile, and they say with no emotion, "Make sure your bag fits in this box please." You glance at the tiny little box and begin trying to shove your oversized carryon in. One corner in means another bulges out. You are leaning on it with a knee and an elbow when the attendant, with just as little emotion, lets you know you can pay \$40 at the gate to check your bag, each direction. Or you can leave it here.

Well your ticket just doubled in price, and your pride took a serious hit. But it is moments just like this where wisdom can take root. There is a lesson here. Sometimes budget prices really are too good to be true, so read the fine print. That is wisdom.

As Christians, we have a book dedicated to learning wisdom. It is filled with nuggets of hard-earned wisdom from the lives of ancient believers. Many of which still hit-home today. Here are couple Proverbs, and a word or two about them.

Proverbs 20:17—Bread gained by deceit is sweet, but afterward the mouth will be full of gravel.

Here's one important thing about wisdom: it acknowledges the complexity of the world. Bread gained by deceit will taste sweet. When you cheat your way into something you want, it can be enjoyable. The rewards are nice, and there is no denying that. But the gain turns from sweet to filling the mouth with gravel. Have you ever chewed gravel? I haven't, but it sounds horrible.

Proverbs 15:1—A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.

A second thing about wisdom: its not black and white. This proverb has a warning in it: a soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger. There are a number of times where a soft answer is called for. We can yell at someone because we've had a bad day—and this will only compound the problem. But there are other times where a soft answer is avoiding a situation that requires a harsh word. This proverb isn't saying never be harsh. It's reminding us of the cost.



It's primary purpose are to provide handicap-accessible restrooms, another ground-floor multipurpose room, a more accessible Deacon Pantry, and to free space in our existing building. The lack of this space has been especially felt during recent funerals, where there was no gathering room for families or sufficient restrooms for guests.


We have been very encouraged by all the positive feedback, but with any decision of this magnitude, we know there are differing opinions. We want to assure you that the decision to build was not undertaken lightly. After many months of conversation, hours of work by our building committee, prayer, and soliciting the thoughts of the congregation, we came to the conclusion that this building will help our church to better fulfill its mission in the world. It will help us serve our own and our community. We are excited for the opportunities it presents, and hope that you will share our excitement.

Our plan is to begin construction as soon as possible, to make sure that we are able to get the remainder of the insurance money from the Campbell House. Any donations to the Building Fund will go directly to the new Administrative Building, and whatever amount we raise over the cost of construction will be used to refurbish our existing space. Update from Room In The Inn {RITI} March 2016

The RITI board reports that as of 28 Feb 2016 we served 34 individual guests, 1622 meals, 529 cumulative nights of shelter. To date last year we served 30 guests, 1184 meals, and 395 nights. This season many of our guests have found full time/part time employment and some have been able to have their own vehicles. The little we do, helps many.

We will serve as the Host Church again on Friday, March 18th and again Saturday March 26th.. If you are willing to serve in any capacity, please contact Lil Noble or see the sign up sheets in the back hallway.

As you know, St Jude's church used our facilities while they served as host church last season and the first part of our current season, from 15 Dec through 18 February. On 19 February they opened their own facilities to the Room in the Inn ministry.

On Friday March 18th, St Jude's has invited us to bring our guests to enjoy the Knights of Columbus Fish Fry {prepaid already}. The fish fry is from 5:30 – 7:30 PM. This means a change to our usual procedures. We need a volunteer to pick up {and accompany} our guests at Calvary at the usual time {5:45 PM} and take them to St Jude's Family Life Center (building behind the church) for dinner. The Volunteer will stay and join the guests for fish fry dinner before bringing them to the fellowship hall for the night. It would be marvelous if others who enjoy a fish diner {\$7.00/person} will consider meeting up with them at the hall and stay to fellowship with our guests. Anyone willing to transport our guests and enjoy a delicious fish dinner should contact Lil Noble or sign up on the sheet.

GUATEMALA MISSION TRIP



Guatemala is a country located in Central America, south of Mexico. It's capital is Guatemala City, and that is where our team will be serving.

Guatemala was once the core of the Mayan civilization. As such, a rich tradition of Mayan culture, language, and crafts still exist. Guatemala endured a long civil war between 1960-1996. That civil war left the country in much disarray.

Several years ago, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church decided to focus on Central America as a mission point. The CP Church has a lot of churches, schools, and ministries already in existence in the United States and in Colombia, South America. Central America is located nicely in between the two, and so our mission's boards decided to focus on Central America. Since this focus began, the CP Church has sent 3 Colombian missionaries to begin work in Guatemala: planting churches, administering a medical clinic, and now staring a Hot Lunch Program.
