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Shrove Tuesday

This Tuesday, February 9th, is a special one in the church calendar. It is known as Fat Tuesday, or Mardi Gras (which is just French for "Fat Tuesday") in some places, but here at Scottsboro CPC, we call it **Shrove Tuesday.** We cook up pancakes at the church, eat them in excess, and have a good time sitting around. If you have questions on where this is from, or what it is—we did too! So we did some research to clear it up.

Shrove Tuesday marks the beginning of Lent. Historically, Christians would often fast from sugar, leavened flour, and eggs (among other foods) during Lent. Which is much harder if they are staring at you from inside your pantry. So the *last* day before Lent, they would cook a meal that could use up as many of those ingredients as possible. That led to the cooking of pancakes. Christians would take all those soon-to-be-uneaten ingredients, and turn them into one gigantic and delicious meal.

This has given Shrove Tuesday—aka Mardi Gras—a celebratory atmosphere to it. But this can miss the point. Shrove Tuesday is, after all, a way of getting ready for Lent. It's a last hurrah before 40 days of fasting. Which is why it is called, "*Shrove* Tuesday." "

"Shrove" is the past-tense of the Old-English word, "shrive." Which is helpful if "shrive" is a word in your working vocabulary. Since it wasn't in ours, we looked that up too. Shrive means "to go to confession and get absolved of sin." So Shrove Tuesday is *"Go to Confession and Get Absolved of Sin Tuesday."* It kicks off a season of repentance and confessing our sins with one last hurrah.

When it comes down to it, it's really a matter of practicality. It is TOUGH to fast from something when that thing is staring at your from your pantry. Or popping up everyday in whatever capacity. So Shrove Tuesday is a day where we get ready for the big fast by getting rid of the temptations. This popped up on your pastors' Facebook feeds this week: one of our friends celebrating Shrove Tuesday right.

GUATEMALA MISSION TRIP



Guatemala is a country located in Central America, south of Mexico. It's capital is Guatemala City, and that is where our team will be serving.

Guatemala was once the core of the Mayan civilization. As such, a rich tradition of Mayan culture, language, and crafts still exist. Guatemala endured a long civil war between 1960-1996. That civil war left the country in much disarray.

Several years ago, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church decided to focus on Central America as a mission point. The CP Church has a lot of churches, schools, and ministries already in existence in the United States and in Colombia, South America. Central America is located nicely in between the two, and so our mission's boards decided to focus on Central America. Since this focus began, the CP Church has sent 3 Colombian missionaries to begin work in Guatemala: planting churches, administering a medical clinic, and now staring a Hot Lunch Program.
